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Introduction

- ▶ Refers to the ties between individuals or groups of different ages.
- ▶ How did the programme come about in Gormanston Wood?



➤ Preschool age: 3-5yrs

- Painting, play games, music, story-telling, jigsaws, bubbles and gardening

➤ Primary School age: 6-13yrs

- Art & crafts, music, newspaper reading, library, choir, general chat, buddy system and games

➤ Secondary School age: 13-17yrs

- Choir, dancing, help in the home, e.g. library deliveries, newspaper reading, card games and general chat



The benefits of intergenerational relationships.

- ▶ **Intergenerational interactions through meaningful activities help young children and older adults to develop positive attitudes and behaviours.**
- ▶ **Older adults with dementia, in turn, experience a decrease in the level of agitation and an increase in positive social behaviours such as smiling, laughter, touching, and reaching out.**



The benefits of intergenerational relationships to residents.

- Help reduce the likelihood of depression and loneliness in the elderly – visits are set up on a regular basis, with the primary school children having a buddy system with certain residents. This was of great benefit to residents who may not have any family visiting them and gives them something to look forward to.



Challenges in Intergenerational relationships

- **There are some risks and challenges to facilitating intergenerational activities.**

Vigilant supervision because both children and persons with dementia can be unpredictable and lack inhibitions, caution must be utilized to ensure the safety of both parties.

- **Increased Planning Time**

Adequate time is necessary for deliberate programming of the shared time together.

- **Space**

Most facilities for adults with dementia don't have the extra space required to regularly accommodate more people onsite.



The children's experience
